

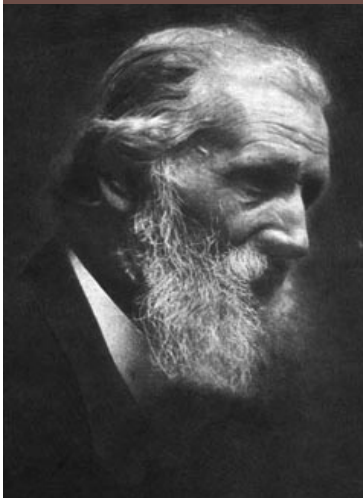

New Officers

Mary Ann Gaebe has accepted the position of Vice President on the John Muir Association Board of Directors. She has served as Treasurer for many years. Raj Hajela has assumed the position of Treasurer, and George Turnbull is the Board's new Secretary.

New Board Members

George Turnbull

George has had a long career in the National Park Service, which he joined in 1980. Just a year later he was selected as the Western Region's first chief of information management, and he worked in that position for 13 years.



In 1994-95, George worked for the successful merger of the Pacific Northwest and Western Regions.

He transitioned into a new position as system support office superintendent for the Pacific Great Basin Support Office, and worked with staff on technical and administrative support for parks in California and Nevada.

In addition to his regional office responsibilities, George was involved in a series of park-specific assignments, including acting superintendent at San Francisco Maritime NHS, acting superintendent and deputy superintendent at Golden Gate NRA.

In 2003, George had an important role in the Pacific West Region's strategic organizational review, which led to the consolidation of park and regional office

staff supervision under four deputy regional directors. George became the deputy regional director for business practices, the position he held for his final nine years of federal service. During this time, George had a series of special assignments, and is especially proud of his role in creating and managing four new National Park units in Pacific West Region: Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front NHS, Port Chicago Naval Magazine NM, Valor in the Pacific NHS/Tule Lake Segregation Center Unit and Cesar Chavez NM.

Now retired, George has continued his passion for visiting national parks (nationally and internationally). He pursues his interests in literature, current events and everything active, especially outdoors. George and his wife Sandy have lived in the East Bay since 1980.

Bruce Campbell

Bruce has been a lifelong devotee of the great outdoors and has enjoyed many treks to the High Sierra. Upon moving to Martinez over 30 years ago, he was delighted to discover the town's connection to John Muir, whom he has always admired. Bruce has years of involvement in volunteer work and nonprofit organizations. For five years, he served on the Board of Directors for the California Bluegrass Association, a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization with approximately 2,600 members worldwide.

He brings energy and focus to his volunteer endeavors, along with skills in marketing methods, strategies and analytics. He looks forward to being a part of the board, developing ideas and helping to bring them to fruition. Both Bruce and his wife Cassie are very involved in events in Martinez. On a vacation to Scotland last year, they made a point to stop by John Muir's home town of Dunbar and "really enjoyed learning more about the roots of the man who changed history with his actions and ideas."

Celebrating the Centennial of John Muir's Legacy

The John Muir Association hosted a reception in September to honor 100 years of John Muir's Legacy since his death on New Year's Eve in 1914. A capacity gathering assembled in the patio of the Visitor Center of the John Muir National Historic Site for wine, food and a sun-filled visit with members of the John Muir Association and other friends of John Muir. An exclusive tour of the Muir House, with special exhibits, was presented by the National Park Service staff. The event was followed by a well-attended camp fire gathering, open to the public, highlighted by tales from John Muir, portrayed by NPS Ranger Frank Helling.



The National Park Service also held a commemoration of Muir's death on Christmas Eve day at the Muir House. Speakers discussed his life, legacy and passing a century before. Muir's funeral service was held in the south parlor, where the centennial tribute took place. A hundred years before, his body lay by the room's bay windows.



Many attendees also shared their thoughts about the meaning of Muir, both to the world and in their

lives. The touching event was covered in local newspapers and television.

Superintendent's View

There is much in store for 2015 at John Muir National Historic Site and we are excited to be open seven days a week again for the upcoming spring season. More days open mean more time for people to visit the Site, learn more about the legacy of John Muir, and hopefully take some of what they learn and apply it in their own lives. Whether it is through our education programs, full moon hikes, or just talking around the campfire, we are working closely with our partners to offer engaging and fun activities for people of all ages and interests.



Our annual celebration for John Muir's Birthday and Earth Day will provide another opportunity to visit the Site and enjoy more than 50 information booths, food, music and kid's activities. If you are looking for a smaller gathering, our campfire programs and full moon hikes offer monthly opportunities to interact with our ranger staff and learn a little more about the place where John Muir lived, farmed and advocated for the preservation of protected lands. Rotating exhibits in the house allow visitors, both returning and those who have never visited, to see artifacts and papers belonging to Muir and his family. The large number of items in our collection cannot all be displayed simultaneously, but by rotating these tangible connections to the past we are able to share more than just by having static, permanent exhibits.

We are engaged in a number of planning efforts which we hope to have completed in 2015. The environmental assessment for the management of the John Muir Gravesite will be released for public comment this spring. In addition, the park staff has been working on the park's Foundation Document, a document being prepared for all 405 National Park sites around the country. These documents define the purpose and significance of a park, identify fundamental resources and values, document existing studies that have been completed, and make recommendations on additional data needs to help manage and preserve the resources and values fundamental to the park. We hope you will take some time to review and provide comments on these documents when they are available and thank the John Muir Association and all of its members for helping us to maintain and preserve this special place.



2014 John Muir Conservation Award Recipients

Camilla Fox

Conservationist of the Year

Camilla is the Founder and Executive Director of the Coyote Project, a nonprofit organization based in Marin, California. Her nomination described her as a “passionate crusader” promoting compassionate conservation and coexistence between people and wildlife through education, science and advocacy.

Project Coyote, a North American coalition of wildlife scientists, educators, predator-friendly ranchers and community leaders, works to change negative attitudes toward coyotes, wolves and other native carnivores.

U.S. Congressman George Miller

Conservation Legacy Award

The John Muir Association has bestowed this award in honor of Congressman Miller’s 40 years of public service and his role as a champion of the environment and conservation in our great country.

One of the last bills he introduced during his long career was H.R. 5699 (113th): John Muir National Historic Site Expansion Act. He was just 29 years old when first elected in 1974. The John Muir Association is pleased to bestow this award in honor of his distinguished career.

River Otter Ecology Project

Nonprofit Conservation Award

The mission of the Project is to illustrate the linkages between the recovery of local river otter populations and healthy watersheds, and foster public and organizational participation in restoration and conservation.

The volunteer-driven organization’s goal is to secure a viable future for river otters in Central California through ecological research, environmental education and strategic restoration partnerships. Through research, the group is determining the conservation status, ecology and basic health information for river otter popu-

lations in the San Francisco Bay Area. The Project fosters its goals through research, education and the citizen-science “Otter Spotter” program.

Redwood Valley Outdoor Education Project

Environmental Education Conservation Award

The Redwood Valley Outdoor Education Project (RVOEP) is a program of the Ukiah Unified School District, and each year more than 2,000 students (1st through 6th grade) visit the program’s 45-acre woodland site for nature-based learning.

RVOEP is not funded by the district, but is supported by the Ukiah community. All of the project’s classes tie to California State Science Standards. Students work with scientists, birding experts and other environmental educators. Fun and exciting activities connect children to nature and echo throughout the year.

Abby Bloomfield

Youth Conservation Award

Abby is a junior in high school who has made significant environmental contributions to her community in Boulder, Colorado. As president of Fairview High School’s Net Zero environmental club, she has led and completed numerous projects, such as: leading an initiative to support new regulations for oil and gas production as proposed by the Air Pollution Control Division of Colorado Dept. of Public Health and Environment, leading efforts to obtain water bottle refilling stations at her school, educating others about bees, writing a grant for fruit trees for her school, and others.
