Rambling the John Muir Way



The John Muir Way is a 134-mile hiking/cycling trail that follows the route that John Muir took when he emigrated from Scotland to the United States in 1849. It begins in Dunbar, his birthplace, and winds along the coast to Helensburgh, a town on the Firth of Clyde where the family boarded a boat to the United States. The terrain is easy to moderate, divided into ten suggested sections. It can be completed in 9-11 days walking or 4-5 days biking. Of course, you can do any part of it as a day hike or multi day adventure!

The route passes through forests and towns, past estates and castles. Much of the trail is along the coast, with views of the Firth of Forth from clifftops and beaches. The trail goes through Scotland's first National Park; Loch Lomond & The Trossachs https:// www.lochlomond-trossachs.org/. There are even some Roman sites along the way. You can find a map of the route along with highlights of things to do and places to stay along the way here http://johnmuirway.org.

The concept of the John Muir Way began in 2010 and was completed in 2014 in celebration of the 100th anniversary of Muir's death. It was created as part of the Central Scotland Green Network (CSGN). Funders included NatureScot, Sustrans, Sportscotland, the Forestry Commission Europe (SRDP), Creative Scotland, local governments and the Green Acton Trust.

Don't forget your raingear! Though you may have to endure a few squalls on your journey, there's always a nice café or pub just a few steps down the road.



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Introducing the JMHS Supervisory Ranger

My name is Wendy Solis and I've been fortunate to work as a Supervisory Park Ranger with a highly skilled and motivated team at the John Muir National Historic Site since November 2022. I began working for National Park Service (NPS) about 10 years ago,

and most of that time was spent on Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay. Working at the John Muir National Historic Site was always a dream of mine. I grew up in Shore Acres near West Pittsburg that is now known as Bay Point. My elementary school was near the site of where the Port Chicago explosion occurred in 1944. I then went to Mt. Diablo High School, the oldest school in the district. Living in these locations and attending these schools spurred my interest in science and history. In college, I learned about conservation, the environmental movement, and the importance of documenting change caused by humans. While working on Alcatraz Island, I realized that I wanted to know more about changes in my own area and how people were affected by the tragedies that took place locally.

While working on Alcatraz, I developed a deeper appreciation of western Contra Costa County history, the history of the Bay Area, and the resiliency of Indigenous People. I realized that John Muir was responsible for promoting the idea of protecting special places like Yosemite Valley for future generations. I knew then that I wanted to play a direct role by working for NPS at the John Muir National Historic Site.

The park visitors we've greeted these last few years vary from locals who've seen the house from the road but never stopped by, to people planning on visiting John Muir's birthplace, to people beginning their road trip to National Parks throughout the country.

We're very lucky to greet all of these visitors and offer them different ways to learn about a unique man, a family, a town, and an agency. We're very fortunate to have this gem in our own backyard. This site is free and open every day of the year except Thanksgiving, Christmas Day, and New Year's. It is rewarding to know that local citizens realize the importance of John Muir and the value of outdoor spaces. Part of our job as park interpreters is to share that knowledge and resources with as many visitors as possible.

I enjoy being part of a team who utilizes the historical aspects of the John Muir Site to tell so many stories. This year, post-covid, we were able to again offer formal house tours, grave site tours, Mt Wanda hikes (full moon, wildflower, songbirds, nature hikes), campfire programs, school fieldtrips, and presentations off site. We've inspired local youths to complete their scout projects with us. We have increased the number of local residents interested in volunteering and have hosted various Bay Area hiking groups. Our goal with each visitor is for them to find their story within our park, connect with the resources, and leave with new knowledge and a fulfilling experience.

One of my favorite John Muir quotes follows:

"Another glorious day, the air as delicious to the lungs as nectar to the tongue."+

John Muir Visitor Center Native Garden

Lucy Lawliss, Superintendent at the John Muir Historic Site in 2007, approached our California Native Plant Society (CNPS) table during the Ranch Days celebration. She talked about creating a native garden in front of the National Park Service (NPS) Visitor Center. She realized that the existing garden of non-native plants didn't reflect the biodiversity of California native plants that John Muir loved. We all agreed that her idea was great. We partnered with Friends of Alhambra Creek (FOAC) and others to get the garden started. Greg Wolford, Native Landscape Designer, was brought on board to design and



plant the garden. Most of his original plantings are still thriving today.

In 2012, a Boy Scouts of America Eagle Scout candidate came to NPS as he needed a project. He approached Horticulturist/ Arborist, Ranger Keith Park. Keith knew that he and FOAC wanted to extend the native garden along the side of the Visitor Center along Alhambra Avenue. The Boy Scouts took this project on

under the direction of Keith Park and FOAC volunteers that suggested native plants for the expansion.

The project began with removal of thirsty turf grass along with layers of landscape fabric that were choking the soil. It was a challenge but the Scouts persevered. They planted many beneficial native plants and laid a stone path through this new section of the garden. Today, FOAC garden volunteers, California Native Plant Society (CNPS), and community folks, continue to maintain the garden on a weekly basis. They add native plants that you will find when you hike our East Bay hills. These plants include: Asclepias speciosa (Showy



Milkweed), and A. fas-

cicularis (Narrow Leaf Milkweed) to benefit monarch butterflies that only lay their eggs on milkweed and Perideridia kelloggii (Yampah) for the Anise Swallowtail butterflies to lay their eggs on. Native plants provide food and shelter for birds and insects and we hope that you will propagate similar native plants in your own gardens. Native plants are drought tolerant and require less water in our hot/dry summers.

In Martinez, follow the "Alhambra Native Plant Trail." The trail is a series of gardens that stretch from the Amtrak Station to the John Muir Historic Garden that was created in 2010. Look for an article about the "Trail" in Alhambra Native Plant Trail Map by FOAC member, Doug Burgess.

In July, JMA Board member, Susan Garbarino, traveled to Glasgow, Scotland to deliver the John Muir Association's annual "Conservation Award to a Non-profit Organization" to Toby Clark, John Muir Award, Scotland Manager (see picture below). The Board had presented the award to the John Muir Trust at Birthday/ Earth Day on April 22, 2023.

The John Muir Trust (JMT) https://www.johnmuirtrust.org/ is a land trust, similar to the Nature Conservancy. Celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, the JMT owns many properties in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland including Ben Nevis, the highest mountain in Britian. All of this land will be preserved as wild space and managed to support natural ecosystems. John Muir would be pleased.

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In addition to its land trust work, the JMT runs the John Muir Award; an inclusive, non-competitive award program completed by thousands of people each year; primarily school children throughout the United Kingdom.
